Beginning February 5th

As Christians in the Congregational Way, we are serious about understanding the Bible, but not dogmatic fundamentalists. We welcome the emerging trends in philosophy, science, and ethics, believing that they can sharpen our thinking and shed further light on the life of faith. Founders of many colleges and universities, we are not anti-intellectual. For us knowledge of the Bible and of the world are ways through which we know God.

This series is designed to help us practice and sharpen our mainstream way of being orthodox Christians. The focus will be on what we need to believe about, and how we relate to, Jesus. Along the way we will also touch on some things that serious Christians do not need to believe.

Not everyone will agree with the book. That is expected; I don't agree with everything in the book myself. We are not endorsing the book. We are endorsing open minded, serious discussion. Differences of opinion will be respected, even encouraged.

THIS PASTOR PONDERES

While most of you claim the summer sun, winter is my favorite time of year. As you have been glad for rain instead of snow, I have suffered from the unseasonable warmth. I need winter. In winter I see much more clearly my world, and what I am; a speck of temporary, warm jelly united with a vast and icy cosmos, insulated from the unfathomable cold reaches of space by the thin atmosphere of earth.

I saw this again during a cold snap a few weeks ago, on a dark night in the snow mantled woods. My wife, Beth, and I walked a mile or so along a forgotten trail, the way forward showing in our headlamps. Then we turned off the lights. Immediately all was silent, black, and shapeless; I became very aware of the rhythm of my breath in the stillness. In a few moments our eyes began to adjust. First the gross outlines of the trees took shape against the sky. Then the details of the branches and needles resolved themselves in the dim but well spread light reflected on the snow. It was the light of the moon and the stars. As we resumed our walk I thought of how what seem to me mere twinkling points in the sky being actually massive, long dead suns emanating fossil light just now reaching us. I thought of supernovas and dark matter and all the heavens beyond my sight and comprehension.

Each day these vault above me, overwhelmed by the immediate and powerful light of the near star for which my physical eyes are calibrated. I wonder; spiritually am I as short sighted? The light closest to me, that immediate light of my perception and understanding has my attention and is my daily guide. In this light I assume that I really see; not much else matters or seems real. Yet beyond my sight is an incomprehensibly vast, mysterious cosmos of which I am only occasionally and dimly aware. My comprehension has little to do with the real universe of titanic forces, vast distances, eternal timeframes, odd motions and confounding, counter intuitive physics. The Apostle Paul invites us to wonder; *“For by him all things were created; things in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible...all things were created by and for him. He is before all things, and in him all things hold together.”* And this physical world is only one dimension of God’s creative work! Am I as short sighted to the things of the spirit as I am usually blind to scope of the heavens above?

In our light soaked region you must get away from the illumination of the towns and farms for the sky to reveal itself. I’ve noticed an exciting, similar pattern with my spiritual sight. Somehow, when I turn off the glare of my own definitions and understandings and let my mind hang wide open, and wait, by a miracle, I see a little more. It is thrilling, and I want to see further. I hold fast to the promise that someday I will see all the way. Paul describes it like this; *“Now we see but a poor reflection as in a mirror; then we shall see face to face. Now I know in part; then I shall know fully, even as I am fully known.”* I understand this to mean that after death physical and spiritual sight will, in some way, unite. In that moment I will be simultaneously see the beauty of the ridges that compose my finger print and the awesome collision of galaxies, my utter insignificance in all that has been, is, and shall be, and God’s eternal, glorious magnificence. For me, this will be the last and greatest miracle.

HELLO CHURCH!

Over the past year there has been a verse that has etched itself on my heart. That verse is Esther 4:16: "If I perish, I perish". At this point in the story of Esther, she is asked to go to King Xerxes to plead for the lives of the Jewish people. But as the limits of her station would have it, she goes before the king at the risk of her own life. Yet knowing that she is the hope of her people, she commits herself to the task, and accepts the likely outcome, "If I perish, I perish."

About a year ago I met a real life Esther. At the time I was at a mission in the Dominican Republic called Mission Emmanuel. While I was there, the group helped build houses, deliver clean water around the village, play with the local school children. The usual mission kind of things. But while we were there, we were offered a slightly different opportunity. One day we were packed on to school buses and taken to the local Leprosarium, which is just a fancy way of saying a modern leper colony.

As we were pulling up to the gate outside the compound, a man was sitting there in his wheel chair waving at us. He had no feet, there were thick bandages around his arm and his hand that he was waving had only one finger. So if there was any doubt as to where we were going, that cleared things up. As we got off the bus, we met outside a series of small apartments that had their backs turned to us. We were met by the doctor that cared for the community there, and he greeted us with a lesson on what leprosy really was, and how history has bred misgivings about the disease. (Did you know that the disease is contracted through inhalation?) He said that in the 40 year he had been working there, he never heard of a visitor contracting the disease, so we could rest easy. In fact we were encouraged to hold hands and to wrap our arms around the patients as much as possible. There is one thing that these people craved it was physical touch. But he also said. "One day I will catch leprosy, and when I do... nothing will change. I will just continue my work and then die among my people." As he said that, Esther's words rang in my head, "If I perish I perish".

I carry with me a lot of stories from my day at the Leprosarium, but the most significant story I walked away with was that of the doctor's commitment. Esther and the doctor have something great in common. As God had gifted Esther with beauty, intelligence, and bravery. God had also gifted this doctor with the same kind of inexhaustible bravery. They acknowledged that they had been designed as a tool for God's work, and they readily gave themselves to Him. As Christians we are occasionally asked to call upon a divine kind of bravery as we wade into the struggles of our friends and family. When we think ourselves lacking, I would just like to remind you all to consider the story of Esther and that of the doctor.

At the 2012 Congregational Budget Meeting in January Church Moderator Molly Minnick gave an overview of the work the board of Ministry has done to focus the ministry of the church on meaningful goals. She also explained how this was reflected in the church budget. Her comments were so comprehensive and helpful that I asked her to allow us to publish them in this newsletter in three installments. (Molly opened the meeting with prayer, and then proceeded to her comments)

“Father in heaven we thank you for the opportunity to serve you as a congregation of believers. You bless us in so many ways. We are grateful for the gift of music, for the dedication of our teachers and our youth leaders, for our spiritual leaders and for everyone who serves you in their own special and unique ways. As we gather together now to do the important work of your church be with us in spirit and bless us with your grace. Amen.”

Please review the Board of Ministry Goal Areas for 2011-2012. These goals, approved unanimously by the board this summer, drove the budget discussions and led us to the proposal which was presented at our December meeting.

Central to our goal areas is the goal of growing the church in a meaningful way. By growing the church, we mean offering programs that facilitate the spiritual growth of our current members and friends. We want to grow the church through:

- *Thriving small groups, Bible studies being done and lay ministers and Steven Ministers being trained.*
- *The youth in our church through active and engaged youth groups, Sunday school classes, VBS, children’s music programs and Children in Worship and Follow Me Programs.*
- *Engagement with our fellow believers in doing mission work in our community such as the 3rd Sunday throw down, offering the Community Thanksgiving Dinner, supporting the Basic Needs Center and housing the Baby Pantry.*
- *The active recruitment of new members. We want to offer exciting programs that will draw people to us in the spirit of Christian fellowship. This goal area is central as we feel that in order to survive for another 100 years we must continue to grow in all areas.*

The other three goals areas include a goal related to increasing our awareness of the financial matters of the church and much has already been accomplished here. We have dedicated ourselves to having an outside accounting firm audit our books for the first time in 10 years. This audit has been complete and the Business Committee will be reviewing it at our February meeting.

WALK TO EMMAUS

The Gospel of Luke relates the story of two disciples of Jesus who were going along the road from Jerusalem to Emmaus. As these two friends were walking together, they shared their hearts deepest concerns about the death of Jesus. An unknown person joined them and explained the scriptures as they walked. Toward the end of the day's travel, they urged the stranger to eat with them. As the stranger took bread, blessed, broke and shared it with them, their eyes were opened and they recognized the risen Christ. Then they rushed back to Jerusalem to share the good news with others. *Luke 24:13-35.*

There is talk about the Emmaus Community. What is it?

The Walk to Emmaus is based upon *Luke 24:13-35* and is an experience of Christian renewal and formation that begins with a 3-day short course in Christianity. It is an opportunity to meet Jesus Christ in a new way as God's grace and love is revealed to you through other believers. When the Walk is completed, there are Gatherings each month on the second Friday to nurture this process of discipleship, fellowship, worship and instruction. Normally the Lansing and surrounding counties gather at Pilgrim United Methodist in St Johns. In February, the Gathering will take place at First Congregation Church. All of you at First Congregation are invited to this potluck Gathering. This community is non-denominational, comfortable and just really loves Jesus. It is truly a moving and
