Spaghetti Dinner

Sermon and Group Study Series

“What’s the Least I Can Believe and Still Be a Christian?”

What, when it comes right down to it, do Christians *need* to believe? Christians need to believe in Jesus—his life, teachings, example, death, and resurrection. These are to core of Christianity. A great benefit of these beliefs is that they provide answers to life’s most profound questions, including, What matters most? Am I accepted? Where is God? What brings fulfillment? What about suffering? And is there hope?

During this series we will also focus on some things Christians don’t need to believe. For example, Christians *don’t need* to believe that everything in the Bible should be taken literally, or that God causes cancer and car wrecks, or that God hates gay people.

Date: Sunday Worship Theme:

- Feb. 5th** Some of what you think is Christianity is not Christianity; it is merely the accrued junk of misunderstanding. Prepare yourself for the real deal.
- Feb. 12th** Jesus was not much of a theologian; in fact, he almost never references dogma. Nor does Jesus have much use for religious rituals. What did Jesus teach? That relationships, with God and others, is what matters most.
- Feb. 19th** We are flawed, sinful people; just look at the world we have made! Yet God sees us as lovable, redeemable, and of infinite worth. He has acted on these beliefs by sending us Jesus, his Son. There is a name for this; we call it ‘grace’.
- Feb. 26th** How does God do his work in the world? Through us, in Jesus’ name, via the Holy Spirit.
- Mar. 4th** Happiness—joy, really—comes for being God’s person in the world. How is one God’s person? By serving others in God’s name.
- Mar. 11th** Jesus promised that those who followed him (believed and obeyed him) would suffer. Why? Because God enters into suffering and redeems that suffering.


Cost: \$60 per person.

HELLO CHURCH!

Christmas trees are rather fascinating. As you stand in front of a Christmas tree, you are invited to look into a family’s memories. There are hand-made beaded wreaths made in the scouts, pictures of grinning children framed by Christmas trees, garland strung together while watching Elf, ornaments and trinkets that mark the passing of years and milestones hanging from pine branches, and of course the beloved star or angel that takes the place of honor on the highest bough.

As you read this, it is likely that my family will be un-decorating our annual tree. Packing away our memories and baubles for the next year. As we approach closer to the top of the tree we will pack away the most important of ornaments: my mom’s baby socks, a green globe that appeared on my parents’ first tree, a pair of mini ice-skates that were knitted by my great-grandmother, and the nativity ornament.

This nativity ornament caused quite the stir in my family back in the day. When my sister, Cortney, and I were little, our parents took us to Bronner’s to look at all the Christmas decorations. We were each allowed to pick out one ornament to bring home. Cortney picked out this awesome Santa one! When plugged into the light strand, the Santa would spin from the trapeze bar he clung to. This Santa has long since stopped spinning, but you can still find him on our tree, squished between the Grinch and macaroni noodle angel I picked out the nativity ornament that marked the year of our Bronner’s adventure, 1991. My sister uses the selection of this ornament to mark the moment in my life when I got all “religious”. I was five.

In seminary, you are regularly asked: “How long have you known Jesus?” or “When did you come to Christ?” Lots of people have dramatic stories of falling to their knees at their lowest point, or stories of Christ speaking to them in their skepticism during college... I mark my story with an ornament. I am fortunate to have known that Jesus was my Lord since I was a little girl. Even though I have strayed from the narrow path (Matthew 7:13-14) I have always known that I belonged to the Lord. During the seminary journey, I have learned how to define and convey my relationship with Christ through story. When someone asks me about coming to Christ, I tell him or her about our Christmas ornaments, and about a childhood lived with the knowledge of Christ’s love.

When Christianity was young, people that called themselves followers of Christ were storytellers, as Christ himself was. They shared stories about Jesus as he walked ancient dusty roads (which we can now read about in the Gospels) and they shared stories about the Lord’s grace, hope, and his call to peace. The early Christian people, shared these stories, used them to teach about God’s character and his promise. But uniquely, the early Christian people told about how Christ worked in their individual lives, We can see this in the stories that Paul shares in his letters. Our modern western society has lost its skill at being storytellers. We are still a people that like to be entertained, certainly. Look at how we value actors, musicians, and athletes. Can we rebuild this ancient tradition? A tradition that sparked and fueled the Christian movement?

I call to you, my church, to try and answer a question: “How do you mark your relationship with Christ?” Let’s unearth this ancient tradition of storytelling, by talking about how we came to Christ. Let’s start talking about Christmas ornaments. Because it is these stories that lead us to sharing about our Lord and savior, to spreading his Gospel. In this winter season, while the earth is hibernating, let us use this time to reflect on our walk with Christ. So that when we are offered the opportunity to share our stories, we can share in this most ancient of Christian traditions.


Don't forget to bring your items for the THIRD SUNDAY THROW DOWN! All donations go to the "Basic Needs Center" here in St. Johns. They need our support!
