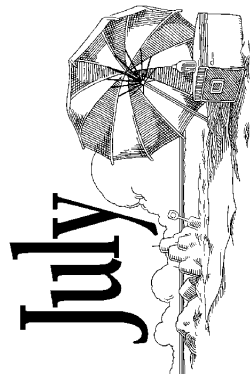

WHAT IS THE CROP WALK?

The CROP Walk is an annual event sponsored through Church World Service, an interdenominational Christian organization, to fight hunger and poverty locally and globally. Hungry people in developing countries typically walk as much as six times a day to get food, water, and fuel. We walk to be in solidarity with their struggle for existence. We walk because we want to end hunger one step at a time. When we participate in the CROP Walk, we collect donations to fight hunger in our own community by sending 25% to local agencies such as the food bank, Meals on Wheels, and the St. Johns Ministerial Association's food relief fund. Many churches and service groups in St. Johns will join together this fall to walk to raise money for the 26th annual CROP Walk. The walk is scheduled for the 1st Sunday in October and is a 5 K (3.2 miles) walk in St. Johns. More information will be shared about the walk in the coming months, but I hope to have many from our church participate.

Your Will Be Done on Earth, O Lord

Perhaps, as you read the title, a tune popped into your head. We have been singing these words intermittently throughout the Pastoral Prayer during Sunday morning worship for about two months. Feedback regarding this new addition has been mixed, so I will share the reasoning behind corporate singing during corporate prayer.

Remember that the mission of the Music Ministry Team is (1) to support and sustain a *creative atmosphere that supports worship* for each member; (2) to encourage *active participation* for the purpose of worship; and (3) to *proactively develop musical worship experiences* that are varied, meaningful, and personal.

The text, from the Lord’s Prayer, reminds us that we pray out of our earthly experience, desires, and vision. We must acknowledge who God is, express our praise, and present our needs or desires. HOWEVER, we must also release our expectations, and accept that our prayers may be answered in surprising ways, and in the Lord’s time. Praying “Your will be done on Earth” is easy to say, but it is NOT easy to mean with one’s whole heart. At least not for me. I appreciate that we have several opportunities to raise our voices, to release our prayers, and to relinquish our ideas about how the prayers should be answered. When we alternately listen and sing, we add our collective voice to that of our pastor. This way, we magnify the voice that reaches Heaven, and engage person more fully in the action of prayer.

The responses to date have been overwhelmingly positive regarding extemporaneous piano music during the prayer, but that singing interrupts the flow of the prayer. That IS the point; it’s a speed bump. We all hate them, but they sure are effective. We are accustomed to make things happen in our daily lives, but our purpose in prayer is NOT to tell the Lord what to do, it IS to lob the ball into His court. By interrupting the flow of the prayer, we practice engaging our total concentration on the activity of prayer. Yes, that is work. THAT is prayer.

Our prayer time is immeasurably important. If the addition of music enhances our efforts (see our mission statement), then we as a Music Team can be grateful that we are effectively doing our job. If, after practicing this new model of collective, active, creative prayer, the body finds that music hinders our efforts, we can adjust appropriately and be thankful for your willingness to explore with us. Please pray about this with us, examine your responses, and stay in touch.

Worship strengthens the body of Christ, changes lives, and reveals the Lord Jesus. When we worship we ask the Holy Spirit to be with us, to show us how, because worship is God's work, Spirit calling to Spirit, deep calling to deep.

Worship is not a passive experience. One does not observe worship as one observes a soccer game. Just as you play soccer or you aren't a soccer player, one participates in worship or one is not a worshipper. Worship calls for full attention, eyes wide, ears attuned, mind awake engagement. If you come "to worship" in order to check that task off the list you are missing the whole point, and may be better off not coming. (Yes, I am concerned about you, who sit at the back or in the balcony, as removed as you can be from the action. Do you want to observe and not participate? Why don't people want to sit down front?)

Aside from the Spirit of God, music is the most potent element in a worship service. It has a matchless capacity to open the worshiper's heart to God, accessing the soul more quickly, deeply, and permanently than any other art form (yes, that includes the sermon, says this preacher). Further thoughts:

1. Music is cultural. In this church we center solidly on hymns, anthems, and praise choruses whose texts reflect the collective terminology of Christian culture and whose musical style is appropriately "churchy".
2. The church's culture of music is largely irrelevant to those outside the church. Non church goers don't listen to music that sounds anything like church music. They don't understand or appreciate it. Church music is as foreign to them as the music of a Shinto shrine is to you.
3. The church's culture of music is largely irrelevant even to us (I mean you) within the church. Do you know why we sing the Gloria Patri (If you are asking "What is the Gloria Patri?" and have attended worship here more than five or six times, you may be stunned to find that we sing it every Sunday). Do you know where it is in the worship service, and why we sing it in that place? How about the Doxology? (If you are saying, "What is a Doxology?", you are making my point for me) Why do we sing the Doxology as part of worship? What is its function in worship? If you cannot answer these questions with specific clarity, then the Gloria Patri and Doxology are just markers you check off as you move through the structure of the service. As for spiritual significance you may as well do the "chicken dance".
4. Though there is a broad category of music called "sacred music", not musical form is sacred. We don't believe in sacred buildings, places, or rituals (except the sacraments). Other traditions do, we don't. We certainly don't believe that music is sacred.
5. The purpose of the worshiping church is to honor God, and bring others to his Son, Jesus the Messiah. Jesus told us to "go and make disciples of all nations...and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you." (Matthew 28: 19-20). This work of spreading the faith is called "evangelism".
6. Culturally relevant music is necessary for evangelism. If we are unwilling to worship using music that is more accessible to non church goers, we are saying that we don't want non Christians to come to our church, experience Christ, confess their faith, and join the community of believers.

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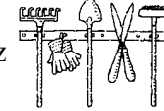
YARD WORK

Seed fell on rocky ground, where it did not have much soil, and it sprang up quickly, since it had no depth of soil. And when the sun rose, it was scorched; and since it had no root, it withered away. Other seed fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked it, and it yielded no grain. Other seed fell into good soil and brought forth grain, growing up and increasing and yielding thirty and sixty and a hundredfold.

- Mark 4: 3-8 (NRSV)

I have been looking at photos of the Grand Canyon lately. As I marvel at God's work of deep browns, burnt oranges, and bright reds, I consider what I learned at the NAPF training in early June: Faith formation can start very small and can take a very long time to develop. It is God-driven, mysterious, holistic, and contextual. Similarly the Canyon's mysterious formation, brilliant colors, and timeless qualities awe me. Developing our faith is a process.

For some of us, we remember people who talked to us about God, the Spirit, and Jesus. I recall my grandmother Pearl visiting from Illinois every summer and demanding that we attend church. We hated waking up early (and somehow my father eventually got out of the requirement), but a seed was planted that first summer. Subsequent summers we traveled to her home in Stockton, Illinois and the same expectation engrained itself into my head. Church was a part of life, the given, the way Grandma Pearl believed and strengthened her faith. For me, it was a continuation of the slow process of deciding whether or not I wanted to be a Christian. I loved the singing, I loved the stories, and I loved the people.

In my teen years I continued my grandmother's tradition and dragged my younger brother to a summer bible camp on Chadwick Road in DeWitt's country farmland. My brother and I would wake up at 8 a.m. and jump on a bus to be driven to this itty bitty country church and school house to learn about God. I accepted Christ as my savior there in that little school house, and I wonder if my brother remembers that seed being planted.

In my young adult life, college rarely allowed any time for church -- at least this is what I told myself. I did journey around to different buildings and denominations in search of a style that might fit me. After I moved to the south-western corner of Michigan, I began attending a little nondenominational church filled with German descendants and thick accents. Initially I thought the theatrics of the accents and the acoustic guitar and singing drew me in, but looking back I see my faith was forming like a plant from seed to maturation.

My life's context -- a unique combination of my experiences, relationships, and circumstances -- weaved its way into how my faith developed. My faith did not form in a vacuum. My family life, student life, work life, social life, physical health, emotional state, intellectual pursuits all inter-connect and overlapped with my spiritual life. My journey to baptism in my thirties did not begin with a "flash" or a particularly dramatic experience. It began with a tiny insight, random visits to my granny's house, barely noticeable and sporadic.

As our youth are making their way to Arizona for some seed planting, I ask that you see faith as a long-term journey -- a marathon, not a sprint. Retreats, conferences, and missions provide good soil in which seed can be planted and start to grow. The mysterious nature of faith formation can be awe-inspiring. Take a moment to pray for each of these teens in their journey: Hannah Van Valkenburg, Trisha Cheeny, Ana Witteveen, Becca Stevens, Brooke Witchell and Jamie Cheeny.

Worship...cont.

There you have it; a summary of the rationale for making changes in the musical portion of our worship service.

Changes, under the direction of the Music Ministry Team, will be made in a deliberate way. We will hold on to the best, most relevant of the older music, while introducing some new forms. In the process vocal music will be evaluated to see that it meets the following criteria:

- **Personal:** It will relate in some way to people's everyday lives and involve their whole being, including their emotions. People will find the music reflects their experience.
- **Attractive:** It will engage and hold people's attention because of its excellence lyrically and musically.
- **Singable:** It will be easy to sing, at least for most people. As a bass I appreciate songs written for the voice of a true man. I also like up tempo; it that gives me less time to go flat. But I will not be the standard. The majority will be.
- **Substantive:** It will not be fluffy, vacuous music. It will have theological quality, and speak the truth about God and our heartfelt response to God. It will have both doctrinal and devotional content.

Music that meets these criteria we will PASS on to you to facilitate your worship experience.
