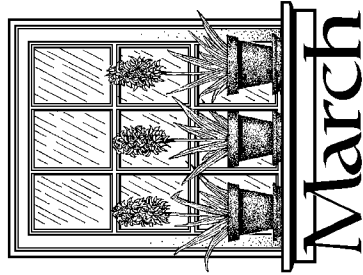

### CARING FOR AGING ADULTS

Marilyn Newman and Kathy Farnum have been working on developing a series of workshops on caring for aging adults. These workshops will take place bi-weekly on Sunday evenings from 7:00-8:30 in the church parlor. The first workshop is scheduled for March 13. **BRING A FRIEND  
TO CHURCH!**

Linda Fitch and I were talking the other day, in light of the recent suicide of a sophomore at my high school in Owosso. I was expressing my sadness as she and I became teary-eyed. I would hate to think that any one of my students doesn't feel the love I have for them. I would hate to have them leave my classroom not knowing that they are thought of so many times every day as I worry about their home lives, consider their personal grief, and make daily lesson plans that will hold their attention and get the message across. And I would hate for them to think that English is more important than love.

I took the time (the day after the suicide) to reflect and get the facts, but the following day, I needed to talk to my students. I set the English lesson aside to talk to all six classes about the love I have for them as we grieved together, cried together, and shared what this event meant to us personally. God gave me the heart and the words that day. Linda and I were thinking, I wish every teacher discussed this with their classes. Some teachers feel like they've had no training in counseling and don't know how to discuss an event of this magnitude; however, Linda and I agreed that it takes no training to show love to one another. Or does it?

Jesus is our example of what it means to love. Can I measure up? Can I forgive that person for not running that ministry team the way I would have it run? Can I love them as my brother or sister? Can I forgive the man that cut me off this morning then immediately slowed down to make a left hand turn? Instead of hanging onto the rage at someone who has harmed me physically, emotionally, mentally, or personally.... can I find forgiveness and love in my heart? Can I discipline my kids lovingly instead of in irritation as my two year old puts the cat in the toilet? Can I argue in a loving manner with my spouse when he drives me crazy at times? It's not that easy after all.

Jesus got angry at people and events in his house of worship, and he expressed disapproval at the elders in the church, attempting to correct their ways. It's not that we must squelch our emotions... it's just that love must be the reason for our decisions. All the time, every day, every where we are, I think we must always act out of love. I discipline my children because I love them, but I must discipline in a loving manner. I inform a neighbor how a comment hurt my feelings because I love her and want to have a loving relationship with her still. I argue (lovingly) for a topic at a board meeting because I am called to love those in my church and their well-being, their programs, their spiritual journey to God, the Father.

Finally, the ultimate sacrifice, Jesus loved us so much in all our iniquity that he died for our sins. Can I love another so much that I can put aside my humanity? I would like to think I would shield a student from harm, but I hope I never see the day when I have to make that choice. Like Jesus in the wilderness praying to his Father... please *Father, if it can be any other way...* none of us want to have that burden. Patricia Maisch, a 61-year-old woman, grabbed the magazine (bullet clip) away from the shooter that attempted to assassinate Rep. Gabrielle Giffords. Taking great courage and trust, she showed her love for all those present. I am not sure I am that courageous. However, I do know that with God's armor, I can love. I am called to love.

Know today that you are loved. Spread this love around until you love even when it is not Valentine's day - every day of every week of every year of your life. And forgive. Lead by example. Let God shine through you. God will give you the strength.

**April 3rd**, in the afternoon, Lou Neuder, a veterinarian, will be our host to tour the Green Meadows Dairy Farm in Elsie.

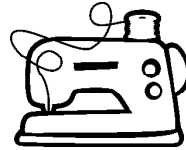
## THANK YOU!

## MURIEL GILSON SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

Much of the congregation at St. Johns First Congregational Church was aware of how much I loved, admired and appreciated Muriel Gilson. The time I spent with her was often the highlight of my week. Most simply put, Muriel was the person I want to be when I grow up. The most powerful leadership is that which happens by example and few were ever better leaders in St. Johns than Muriel – for DECADES. She was a real-life ray of sunshine for everyone with whom she came in contact and provided as much support and encouragement to the young people in this community as was humanly possible.

A few years before her death Muriel was honored by the community for her many contributions and at that time the Muriel Gilson Scholarship Program was started. This scholarship program continues today based on the concept that it is not just about honoring Muriel, but bringing attention to the many attributes that made her such a revered member of this church and citizen of this community.

As a ministry team we feel that instilling an awareness of these attributes in our youth is a worthwhile long-term goal. The scholarship is designed to help fund the beginning of the college education of graduating seniors from the First Congregational Church. The essence of this scholarship is to recognize and celebrate Muriel, and to pass on her gifts of vitality, exuberance and love of life to the young people of our church.

Among the requirements of application for the scholarship is an essay (minimum of 500 words) on the value and importance of looking for the good in others and expressing enthusiastic support on a consistent basis.

Each year around the time of her birthday, we re-emphasize the nature of and reason for the scholarship, encourage the eligible young people to apply and make another effort to add to the funding of the scholarship, so as to perpetuate Muriel's positive influence far into the future.
