Say It!

We congregational Christians tend to be a little hazy in our thinking, and therefore not very good at telling others about our church. We don't always know what we are trying to say.

Jesus was a master communicator. Through preaching, chastisement, teaching, healing, arguing, humor, his touch—through many signs and symbols—he conveyed the message of his Heavenly Father to his Heavenly Father's people. Even his manner of death and resurrection send a powerful message about the nature of God's character and what it means to be faithful to Him. Jesus knew what he was trying to say.

How well do you communicate? Life is largely taken up with information processing, transmission, and your reaction to the information you have received. In a church, especially a congregational church, communication needs to be massive and in multiple directions. Like the cells of our bodies, which communicate, at least indirectly, with all the other cells, we who are in the body of Christ need to communicate if we are to function and be healthy.

What do we communicate? Clarity is important. If we don't know what we are trying to say,

then how can we know how to say it? Are we "on message" about the gospel message. or is our communication as a church muddled? Could you, in two sentences, describe to a stranger the essence of this church?

"How, then, can they call on the one they have not believed in? And how can they believe in the one of whom they have not heard? And how can they hear without someone preaching to them?" -Romans 10:14

I bring this up because in ministry—we are

all in ministry in this church-- it is communication that makes us a team. Let's be united in our ministry, working together for the same purpose. Are you talking with other church members about how your role in our church is going, your hopes and dreams for the congregation, and how you are growing (or not) spiritually? There is nothing more important to talk about!

How about people who are not part of our congregation? Do you make an effort to tell others about our church, its ministry, and the Lord Jesus Christ that the church serves? People won't know unless you tell them.

The fact is, you can't communicate too much. One of the mistakes we often make is the assumption that 'everybody knows'. It is so easy to get lazy and hazy in what we are saying! In actuality, not everybody does know. Discipline yourself to communicate with clarity. Try to gear your message to outsiders, to people who know nothing about our ministry. Be prepared, and eager, to describe our church. Chances are you will benefit as your own thinking and communicating about your role in our church becomes more focused. Further more you will be like Jesus, proclaiming the message of our Heavenly Father.

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Igniting FCC

Why do you come to church? I know, it's a silly question, right? But most people initially come to church for a reason other than God. At least that is what the book I read for our Board of Ministry meetings said. The book is called *Ignite*. I spoke briefly about this book in church last month. The main idea is simple: double your church size in one day. Simple? Are you kidding me, Melanie? Double, you say? Actually it takes a lot of planning and courage, but I think we can get there with God's help. Our church has been mini-igniting (or at least revving the engines) for some time as we have invited friends to church on certain Sundays of certain months. But it takes more than the effort we have been attempting up until now and perhaps a change of focus according to this book, *Ignite*.

One staple of igniting church growth is to invite the un-churched into our midst. Perhaps you have invited neighbors who are unhappy at their present church. Perhaps you have invited family members from out of state who will only be with us for one Sunday out of the year. Perhaps you have invited someone very knowledgeable in the arena of church life. Here is where we can stretch ourselves, says this *Ignite* book.. We need to be inviting the un-churched into our midst. Those that are not going to church or those who do not know Christ should be our targeted audience.

Another helpful tip the book suggested was to intentionally invite those that share our commonalities. One factor is age. What age is our average FCC member? 40 with a family? 50 and getting ready for retirement? 60 and drawing from a pension? This topic of age is one that we discussed for a bit at our last board meeting, because eventually we will get older and need to invest in the youth to sustain our church. We lose some of our youth to out-of-state colleges or they end up moving away after graduating from college to start a family in a different area. Of course the age topic is debatable, but this book said we should aim to invite those that are around our average age at FCC (which the board decided was forty and fifty-year-olds). If you have no friends or co-workers in that age group that are un-churched, make new friends or at least invite those who share another commonality (maybe you both are teachers, have a family, and love fishing).

The tools to inviting someone need not be extravagant. An invitation card with a message of what we are asking them to do (come to our service on Miracles), the date, and the location are sufficient as long as they are clear, very clear. If we invested in a gift (like bottles of water one church gave out at the Mint Festival, along with this pertinent information on a sticker) we would draw more people into FCC. The message is important though; we need to give them a reason to come.

Another tip, invite them to something that will help them in the immediate here and now. Maybe you know of a family that seriously doubts that the Lord is at work in their lives. A sermon on miracles may be just the thing our minister is preaching on in October and November. Perhaps you have a friend at work who thinks Christianity is all about following too many laws and rules that become overwhelming and depressing. Wouldn't it be great if you could tell them that in January and February your pastor will be educating your whole church on core Christian beliefs? Wouldn't it be nice to invite them to something that would clear up misconceptions and open their eyes to possibilities of which they're missing out? A clear message and a reason, perhaps a reason other than God initially, is what it takes to grow a church. Maybe your church is

discussing how to care for aging parents and you know of a neighbor who is experiencing Parkinson's with their mother or father. Perhaps they are not church goers but are looking for answers to financial planning for the elderly. Perhaps you could be the success story of inviting them into FCC and sparking their interest in God.

Of course mass promotion like radio, billboards, newspapers, and fliers have their place in promoting a church (a slower return for your time but still a return on your investment). Consider this: your story and testimony of how you came to Christ (or FCC) or grew in faith through a tough personal trial in life can be powerful. Don't be afraid to share with the unchurched your passion and commitment to God. I encourage you to ask your minister what topics he is planning (hints given above) and I encourage you to look for opportunities to invite others (verbally for now) to a sermon that could be the spark to *igniting* their passion for Christ.

Ephesians 4:11-15

The gifts [Christ] gave were that some would be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers, to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ, until all of us come to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to maturity, to the measure of the full stature of Christ.



ASP 2011- "Follow the Word; Transform the World"

Last month, a crew including Jerry Stevens, John Cheeney, Buddy Stevens, Brad Tooker, Andrew Rademacher, Trisha Cheeney, and myself, Jamie Cheeney, took off for a mission trip to Barbourville, KY in the Appalachian Mountains. We arrived Sunday afternoon and were welcomed by the staffers to Union College where we would be staying along with two other churches in classrooms for the week. We were informed that we would be working along with a crew from Illinois to apply vinyl siding to a large two story house for a seventy-three year old man, Troy, who was living by himself on a very limited income.

We woke up early for devotionals and breakfast before heading out to the work site for our first of five days of hard work. Some of us had to start by learning how to operate simple tools like hammers but we began to expand our vocabulary to include J-channeling, undersill, starter strip, cat's claw, tinsnips, and compound angles. By the end of the week, we could all measure and cut siding to the nearest sixteenth of an inch! But we learned much more than construction terms that week. One night at evening gathering we learned about the history of the area in which we were working and staying. During Lyndon Johnson's "War on Poverty" in 1964, he visited Barbourville as the "poster- town" for poverty in America and unfortunately not much has changed since that time. We talked about a newspaper headline that read "There is No Hope in Appalachia." We discussed the mission of ASP: to make homes warmer, safer, and drier; but many argue that we should teach the people how to make a better life for themselves rather than handing them the materials and service. What we do in those mountains each summer will never solve poverty, but what we can do is bring hope to the people of Appalachia by showing them the love of Christ through our actions.

The theme for the week came from Romans 12:2 -"Do not conform any longer to the patterns of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind so that you can test and approve God's will- his good, pleasing, and perfect will." We were challenged to "follow the word; transform the world" but as usual, greater than the changes to Troy's house were the changes inside each of us. We found a new respect for the people of Appalachia, especially our host and his seventeen year old grandson, Franklin, who worked with us every step of the way. We grew closer to each other and closer to God as we found the strength to work through the heat in His presence in those beautiful mountains.

The friends we made will always be in our prayers and the experiences we shared will always be in our hearts. We would like to thank each and every one of you for the part you had in this opportunity. Our trip was made possible by your financial support and prayers. We are all so grateful for this experience – it is something we will never forget.
