“Not by might nor by power, but by my Spirit,” says the Lord” (Zachariah 4:6)

It is no secret. The influence of the church in American culture is dimming. Most churches are shrinking, ours included. What can we do? Choose from the following options: (A) Keep smiling, hunker down, and hope for the best, (B) Lament, wail, and flap your arms, and run around in circles shouting, “the sky is falling!”. (C) Tighten controls, revamp systems, and organize financially for a long, orderly decline in an effort to keep the building open around the motto, “In Endowments We Trust”, (D) Seek the Lord.

I chose (D). Choosing (D) means being willing to consider, with fearless rigor, the circumstance of the church in the light of God’s Spirit.

That Spirit, which hovered over the formlessness that was to be earth and brought about the definition of being that we see all around us, including ourselves, is still hovering, still creating. Darkness is being separated from the light, and firm ground separating from the seas of water. Creatures are being formed. Creatures are returning to the earth. Everywhere God is at work, moving, shaping recombining, creating the world anew.

From the beginning the church has come from God’s creating Spirit (*read Acts 2 and following for the story*). We didn’t invent the church. God called it into being. Ever since God spoke congregations have come and congregations have gone. All the while the Spirit has been hovering, creating. Just as in nature nothing is permanent in God’s holy ecology except his loving purpose and the work of his Spirit.

We in the church have been tempted to believe in the church as an organization (We can see a building!) more than we have believed in God and the power of his Holy Spirit (We see only with the eyes of faith). But we can’t stay with it. The hovering Spirit keeps submerging old ways and bringing new into the light, churning, upending, reforming. The grandest edifice built by human hands comes tumbling down, and something new, true to the root, rises. Praise be to God for that!

I chose (D) because I am confident in the work of God’s Spirit, for I know God, and God intends love. In choosing (D) I am seeking the Lord and aligning myself with the Spirit’s work; recreation, motion, life. Exactly what that work looks like, here and now, is beyond my knowing, But I do know this. God is at work, and he is creating the word anew, here, now.

Let’s trust him.—Matt





Notes from the Music Ministry Team:

Discerning Our Way Toward God's Vision

I write this article after a momentous week. During our team discernment process to propose a budget for 2015, Chuck Graham felt called to step aside from directing the Chancel Choir. Those who work closely with him have sensed this impending change, but somehow I was unprepared. The man who directed the Choir for 13 years, whose hand welcomed me in, who encouraged me in my spiritual growth, skill development and ministry at FCC was ready to move on, but I wasn't ready for that change. Disheartened, I wrestled with a lot of questions, prayed a lot, and listened for God's voice.

After several days we met to continue our discernment work. Matt spoke to us about engaging from a deep place with a ministry and he asked us to answer the question, "What do we need in order to do our ministry?" Our language immediately shifted from limits to possibilities as we considered what God would have us do: support people's spiritual growth through study, special events, leadership development, and community outreach... as we continue to work and relate together in preparation for weekly worship services.

Immediately after this meeting, the Chancel Choir met to rehearse for worship. They ministered to me by showing up with enthusiasm and a spirit of collaboration. Jan Myers conducted, but as a group we shaped the expression of our working pieces, learned a song that our youth brought back from camp (*Light the Fire* which they sang with us on Sept. 28), and then we circled our chairs to discern our way forward. Everyone spoke, and again I felt ministered to by wise people of faith. They spoke of honoring a call, even if it's not what we would choose. They spoke of adapting our ways to suit God's purposes. They spoke of opportunity. Together we explored what we need in order to do our ministry.

With gratitude I write that the musicians of FCC know who we serve and we understand the gifts that God gave use to minister with: "faith, hope love, strength, compassion, patience, joy. Music is the medium, but these are the gifts. We understand about faithful service even when we can't see the whole vista of God's vision. When we consider our ministry potential through our own gifts and resources, the list looks more like this: busy schedules, fixed incomes, fatigue, varying levels of musical training, aging bodies. God is good. He as done marvelous things for us and through us.

Our process of discernment is ongoing. So is God's work in and though us.

SPIRITUAL GIFTS CLASS

To whom are spiritual gifts given? What is the purpose of spiritual gifts? How can I be sure which particular spiritual gifts I have? Are spiritual gifts permanent or temporary? What does the Bible say about each of the spiritual gifts? How can you understand your gifts and how do those gifts fit in the body of Christ?

The apostle Paul wrote in his letter to the church of Corinth, "Now concerning spiritual gifts, brothers and sisters, I do not want you to be uninformed" (1 Corinthians 12:1). Metaphorically, this course is like a fire hydrant gushing with information which will enable you to deepen your relationship with God, learn about yourself, and enjoy community and fellowship with other participants.

Melanie Lounds will be leading this eight week course one evening per week starting in November. The three days under consideration for the class are Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday after 7 p.m. After seeing which day works best, one will be selected and you will receive a personal phone call from Melanie Lounds registering you for the class. There is a small registration fee to cover the cost of materials, refreshments, and other supplies. Each of the eight modules has devotionals, prayers, and follow-up activities to increase your understanding of the ministry God has called you to. Each session will build on the previous session; therefore, faithful attendance is necessary. Come and enrich your life, and accept the blessings as you embark on a journey of spiritual and personal growth.
